The course you are about to take is rigorous and will require you to **assume responsibility for completing all reading and writing assignments inside and outside of class**. In order to be prepared to engage in close reading and critical analysis of the texts we will be examining, you are being given two summer assignments. All work is to be typed using Times New Roman 12 point font and double spaced.

Bible Stories

Writers often draw inspiration from the Bible and create allusions, metaphors, characters, plots and themes that relate back to the Bible Stories. In order to help you to effectively analyze certain literary works, you must read each of the selections below and summarize each story. At the beginning of each summary you should clearly identify whether the story is from the Old or New Testament, the title of the story, and the chapter number.

The Novel

In this course, it will be important to learn how to respond to essay prompts that deal with fictional works of literature. Therefore, you are to read the novel *The Great Gatsby* by F. Scott Fitzgerald closely and respond to one of the following essay questions:

A. In retrospect, a reader often discovers that the first chapter of a novel introduces some of the central ideas or motifs that will be developed in the novel. Explain how the first chapter of *The Great Gatsby* functions in this way.

B. In many works of literature, the significance of the title becomes apparent gradually. Write an essay demonstrating the significance of the title *The Great Gatsby* to the work as whole. Consider discussing how the author's use of allusion, contrast, repetition and point of view help to reveal the title's significance.

Your essay should be between 2 and 3 pages.

It is highly suggested that you purchase the novel and make annotations that you can refer back to when writing your essay. However, it can also be found online at the following web address: https://ebooks.adelaide.edu.au/f/fitzgerald/f scott/gatsby/

(Note: Please do not watch the movie instead of reading the book!)

Each of the summer assignments will be counted as part of your grade for the first marking period and you will be assessed on each reading assignment when you return to school in September.

Essay Writing Reminders:

- Your opening paragraph must contain a thesis statement. A strong thesis statement is an assertion that is not self-evident and that your essay must prove.
- The arguments in your essay should reflect your active reading and understanding of the entire novel as well as one or more of its overall themes and/or motifs.
- Your supporting arguments must have specific and strong evidence from the book. You may use short direct quotes or paraphrase evidence.
- Citation form page #'s: (150) or (48-49). The period goes after the parenthesis.
- Commas and semi-colons always go inside quotation marks.
- Use transitional words or phrases to connect sentences and paragraphs when needed.
- Proof read your work several times. Do not rely on spell and grammar check.
- Edit and revise carefully on the hard copy first, before typing in corrections.
- The number of body paragraphs is determined by what you have to say.
